- Bring professions together
 - Because each brings unique resources
- Seek understanding of others
 - Without judging each other for differences
- Find synergy & efficiencies
 - While respecting limits asserted by partners
























Privacy

I decide who knows my information.

Confidentiality

You have a duty to protect my information.

Privilege

They can't make you share my information.





Transparency

- Default ethic in many government functions
 - Including law enforcement, prosecutor, probation, courts
- Confidentiality only in special circumstances
 - Sometimes cannot be offered even if professional wants to do so





Confidentiality

- By Ethical Requirement
 - License at risk if violate
 - Liability if harm from the disclosure
 - Ethical exceptions can differ
- By Law
 - Possible crime
 - Fines
 - Revocation of funding
 - Liability if harm from disclosure





"It's Confidential"

- Is *not* a useful generic term
- Does not mean the same thing to everyone
 - -not to clients
 - not to professionals





Professions Collaborating in Family Justice Centers

- Victim Advocacy
- Legal Services
- LawEnforcement
- Prosecution
- Victim Witness
- Medical Services

- Chaplain Services
- Mental Health Services
- Probation
- Social Services
- Housing Programs
- Public Benefits Agencies





Law Enf/Prosecutor Norms

- Accused and witnesses <u>do not have</u> confidentiality with LE/Prosecution
- Information is revealed or withheld to serve investigation & justice
- Transparency required:
 - -Public records requests
 - Disclosures to criminal defendants





"Brady" Disclosures

- Prosecutors & law enforcement must disclose "exculpatory" evidence
 - -Tends to show defendant not guilty

- Failure to disclose?
 - Conviction overturned
 - -Lost law license
 - -Jail time (2013, Texas)





Victim Witness Assistants

- If work for Law Enf or Prosecutor,
 - -Subject to same disclosure rules
- If work for community-based nonprofit,
 - -Subject to Advocate info-sharing norms

- The test is who you work for,
 - -Not where your desk is



Court Information Norms

- Public institutions accountable to the public
- Transparency & open records is generally the norm
 - Unless special requests or statutory protections to seal



Probation & Pre-Trial Supervision

- Generally an extension of the court
- Balancing public safety, community right to know and probationer's privacy



Gov't Agency Norms

- General norm of government transparency, accountability and open records
- Personally identifying information protected from public disclosure
- Sharing between government agencies to achieve public good



Attorney Norms: Confidentiality

- Rule of Professional Conduct 1.6
 - -Shall not reveal info acquired during the professional relationship unless:
 - the client gives informed consent
 - the disclosure is impliedly authorized to carry out the representation
 - the disclosure is permitted or required by this rule



Attorney Norms: Confidentiality

- Rule 1.6 Exceptions
 - -(b) MAY reveal if reasonably necessary to:
 - Comply with law or court order
 - Prevent crime by client
 - Prevent reasonably certain death or bodily harm
 - Fix crime/fraud done with lawyer's services
 - Get legal advice for attorney/check conflicts/comply with state bar assistance



Victim Services Norms: Federal Confidentiality Law

- VAWA 2013 & FVPSA 2010 & VOCA Regulation
 - To ensure safety of victims of family violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking, and their families:
 - Grantees shall protect the confidentiality and privacy of persons receiving services.
- Violation?
 - Revocation of funding & no future funding
 - Lawsuit liability



VAWA/FVPSA/VOCA Prohibition

- Grantees shall NOT disclose, reveal or release:
 - personally identifying information (PII)
 - individual information [VAWA/VOCA]
 - collected in connection with program services requested, utilized, or denied
- Unless written consent or court/statutory mandate



Victim Services: Ethical Principles

- Survivor of violence chooses who knows what
 - -Survivors are experts in their own lives
 - -Survivors choose which risks are acceptable and which are not.



Social Worker Norms: Confidentiality

- Social worker should protect the confidentiality
- Of all information obtained during service
- Except for compelling professional reasons
- May disclose with valid consent from the person
- Disclose minimum amount necessary
- NASW Code of Ethics Rule 1.07



Spiritual Adviser Norms

- Strong tradition of not sharing what is said when seeking spiritual counsel
 - -Definitions of "spiritual counsel" differ
- Shifting social norms after revelations of abuse by priests



Confidentiality Circle

Inside the Circle

Confidential professional and associates in same organization/unit

Outside the Circle

- Law Enforcement
- Government offices
- Other confidential professionals in different units
- Non-confidential professionals
- Funders
- Allies





"I am a Mandatory Reporter"

- Some professions required by law
 - To make specific kind of report in a specific way
 - Definitions differ widely
- Some professions allowed to report
 - Not "mandatory" reporters
- Some privileged professions prohibited from reporting





Communicate Your Norms







MOU's Communicate Norms

- Use MOU to explain your norms
- Use MOU to set collaboration norms
- Want a template MOU?
 - Request a template from <u>safetynet@nnedv.org</u>



Assumptions: Giving ←→ Receiving

- What kind of information exchange is necessary to "collaborate"?
- How can you collaborate without violating information sharing norms?



Concrete Ways to Collaborate

- Be transparent with each other about organizational processes
 - And organizational limitations
- Take advantage of geographic proximity to facilitate survivor control of sharing
 - Don't assume every survivor should share
- Use informed releases <u>only</u> to implement survivor wishes & instructions
 - Releases should never be "expected" or routinely completed
